You will see good news and bad news this year: for example, cigarette use among youth has declined steeply, but high school drop-out rates are up. The percentage of teens who are neither working nor in school has declined, but childhood poverty has increased. There are many statistics that might be useful for grant-writing and program planning. **The Exploratorium** at the San Francisco Palace of Fine Arts is one of the world's premier science museums, showcasing a continually developing collection of exhibits and approaches to exploring, teaching, and discovering science. "Imagine a movement in America that focuses on turning potential dropouts into model citizens. Service learning is that movement," claims the author. Almost half of minority students drop out; high school dropouts rarely participate in civic duties. Since service learning students report an increased desire to work hard and graduate, theoretically it will produce both more graduates and more good citizens!
